

### LESSONS FROM COVID 19 RESPONSE TO THE **UGANDAN ANIMAL FARMERS**

The advantages of quarantine in humans and animals are the same. Do not mix sick animals with others (isolation and social distance must be observed). Asymptomatic animals can still spread the virus just like asymptomatic humans in COVID 19.

So, if you have one symptomatic animal most likely others (contact) also have the infection; they are just asymptomatic so do not take them to the market because you are unknowingly spreading the disease.

"The political will displayed in COVID 19 response is what we need in animal disease control as well. Security for enforcement, ministry of health for health risk communication, Ministry of Trade because animal traders fall here, communication for risk communication. Remember Animal health contribution to the current pandemics is up to 80%," Dr. Gloria Tamale, Veterinary Doctor MakSPH
